OZANIMOD capsules (Zeposia® ▼) for ulcerative colitis

The Pan Mersey Area Prescribing Committee recommends the prescribing of OZANIMOD capsules (Zeposia® ▼), by specialists only, for ulcerative colitis, in accordance with NICE TA828.

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<u>NICE technology appraisal (TA) 828</u> (05 October 2022) recommends ozanimod as an option for treating moderately to severely active ulcerative colitis in adults, only if:

- conventional treatment cannot be tolerated or is not working well enough and infliximab is not suitable, or
- biological treatment cannot be tolerated or is not working well enough, and
- > the company provides it according to the commercial arrangement^[1]

Prescribing and monitoring of therapy must be retained by a specialist in the management of ulcerative colitis.

Costing information

NICE does not expect this guidance to have a significant impact on resources; that is, the resource impact of implementing the recommendations in England will be less than £5 million per year (or approximately £9,000 per 100,000 population). This is because ozanimod is a further treatment option and the overall cost of treatment will be similar to the current treatment options. [2]
